(Not necessarily disease-resistant, but usually pretty good)

<i>Bardsey apple</i>	-	<i>excellent eater from the island (similar to James Grieve)</i>
<i>Afal Brith Mawr</i>	-	<i>mid-season cooker, Newport</i>
<i>Channel Beauty</i>	-	<i>Cox seedling from Swansea</i>
<i>Cissy</i>	-	<i>eater from Malpas, Newport</i>
<i>Afal Coch Cynnar</i>	-	<i>early red eater = Devonshire Quarrenden (adopted Welsh)</i>
<i>Talgarth apple</i>	-	<i>early, light yellow eater from Powys</i>
<i>Gelli Aur Cooker</i>	-	<i>late cooker from original planting of Gelli Aur Mansion</i>
<i>Kenneth</i>	-	<i>eater from North Wales</i>
<i>Leathercoat</i>	-	<i>very late russet from Dinefwr</i>
<i>Machen</i>	-	<i>second early red dual purpose from Chepstow area</i>
<i>Marged (Morgan) Nicolas</i>	-	<i>dual purpose from Dinefwr</i>
<i>Monmouth Green</i>	-	<i>Monmouth to Brecon – also known as Landore</i>
<i>Morgan Sweet</i>	-	<i>adopted early eater/cider, once common in South Wales</i>
<i>Afal Pen Caled</i>	-	<i>cooker from St. Dogmaels, Cardiganshire</i>
<i>Afal Pig Aderyn</i>	-	<i>mid-season general purpose variety – tasty, light cider</i>
<i>Afal Pig yr Wydd</i>	-	<i>mid-season cooker from Llanwrda</i>
<i>Afal Pren Glas</i>	-	<i>early eater from St. Dogmaels, Cardiganshire</i>
<i>St. Cecilia</i>	-	<i>early eater from Bassaleg, Newport (Cox seedling)</i>
<i>Afal Tinyrwydd</i>	-	<i>early cooker from Llangadog</i>
<i>Afal Wern</i>	-	<i>Tenby, Pembrokeshire (Scotch Bridget?)</i>
<i>Gabalva</i>	-	<i>Cooker from Cardiff</i>

A LIST OF RECOMMENDED EATING AND COOKING PEARS:

<i>Jargonelle</i> (2)	... very early eater – first rate flavour but does not keep.
<i>Beth</i> (3)	... early eater – like Williams but smaller. Does not keep.
<i>Concorde</i> (4)	... mid-season eater – better flavour than Conference.
<i>Pitmasten Duchess</i> (4)	... mid-season dual purpose – a little 'grainy' as an eater
<i>Winter Nelis</i> (4)	... very late eater – superb flavour. Eat in Dec.
<i>Josephine de Malines</i> (4)	... very later eater – superb flavour
<i>Catillac</i> (4)	... very late old C17th century cooker. Keeps until Feb.

SUGGESTED PLUMS, DAMSONS, GAGES etc:

<i>Victoria plum</i> (3 sf)	... mid-season dual purpose	We get these to order from a quality wholesaler.
<i>Purple Pershore</i> (3 sf)	... mid-season dual purpose	
<i>River's Early Prolific</i> (2 psf)	... early cooker	All are grafted onto the semi-vigorous <i>St. Julien A</i> or the very dwarf <i>Pixy</i> rootstocks.
<i>Marjorie's Seedling</i> (5 sf)	... late dual purpose	
<i>Shropshire prune damson</i> (3 sf)	... mid-season cooker	We have many other unusual apple varieties in pots and what we don't have we can always get or graft for you.
<i>Cambridge gage</i> (3 sf)	... mid-season eater	
<i>Opal</i> (3 sf)	... mid-season eater
